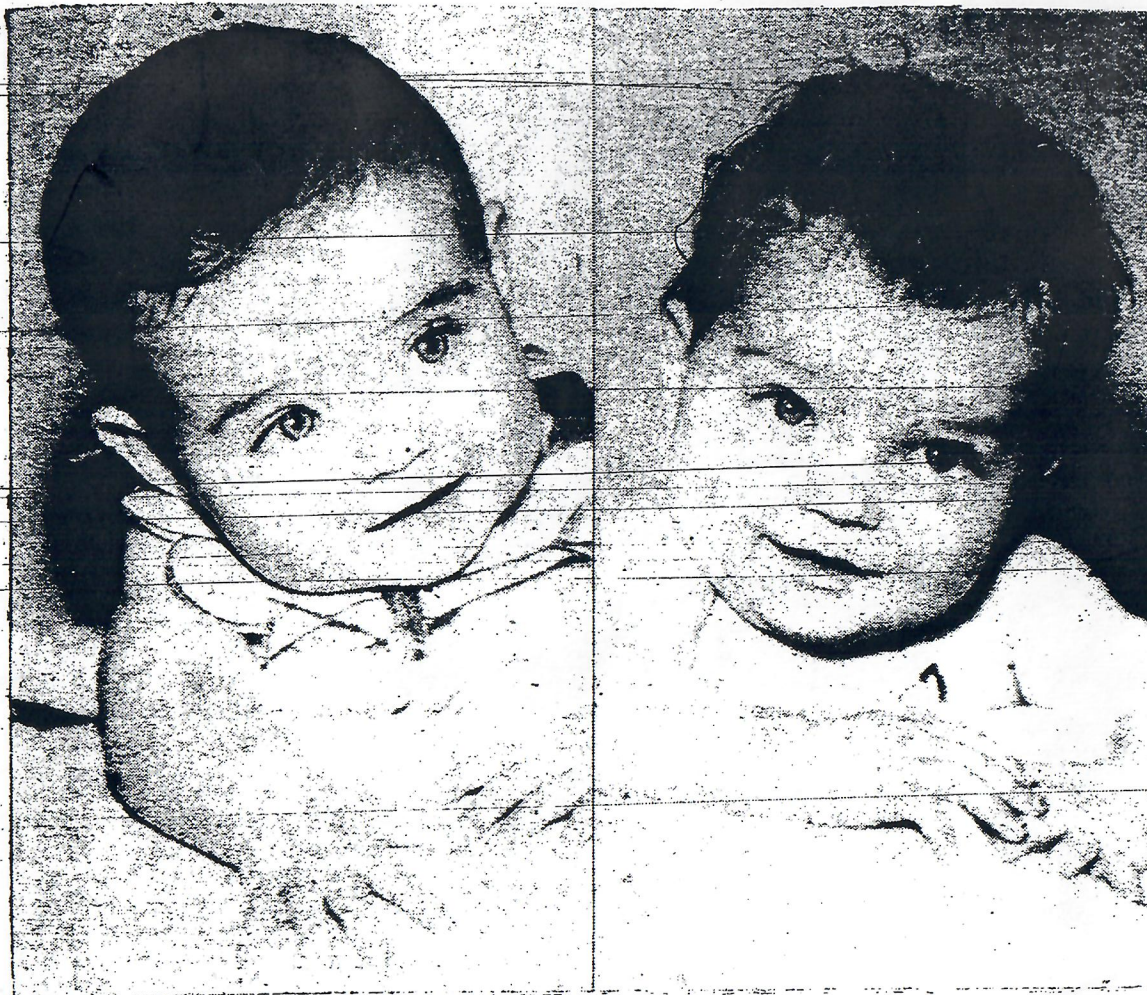


The Weeast Twins Celebrate 1st. Birthday
